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SENATOR CUDABACK: It's a majority of those present, Senator Beutler.

SENATOR BEUTLER: And how many votes does that take?

SENATOR CUDABACK: It's 25 in this case.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Pederson waived his opportunity, so the question before the body is, shall the Chair be overruled? All in favor vote aye, opposed nay. The question before the body is, shall the Chair be overruled? Have you all voted who care to? Have you all voted who care to? Record, please, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 14 ayes, 19 nays to overrule the Chair.

SENATOR CUDABACK: The Chair is not overruled. It will stand divided. Senator Pederson, you can have the choice to make up which one you want to take up first, the one or two.

SENATOR D. PEDERSON: I'll take up one, please.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Number one taken up. Would you want to give us just a short review of that number one? (FA1258, Legislative Journal page 1139.)

SENATOR D. PEDERSON: Number one is the provision to change the Nebraska Constitution, which simply says that the Legislature will not be prohibited from authorizing and regulating games of chance using player-activated electronic gaming devices, and that's for charitable or community betterment purposes in a county, city, or village which approves of such devices at a regular or special meeting (sic) for that purpose, or it will also say that the Legislature shall not be prohibited from issuing to licensees a licensed racetrack enclosure for such gaming. So that does not require a vote of the people, but the one in connection with the communities and villages does. And I have repeated a number of times and that's the reason, candidly,
