And there has been a lot...the only...probably the only thing that I've really learned out here yet, I hope I learn a lot more things, but the only thing I have learned is that when legislation comes out here, potential legislation comes out here, all you folks really like to look at it and say what kind of bite is this going to make? What kind of effect is this going to have? Senator Chambers firmly believes that this is going to move the NCAA. He's got the experience that also dictates that that could very much...I would almost defer that that would very much be something that could happen. But I guess it's also my contention that that has already happened. He's got 30 years of twisting the whole Legislature almost, because in 1988 the bill actually passed, has a history of forcing the NCAA's hand. But the point about this legislation is after all the amendments and everything else, and please correct me if I'm wrong, someone, that this is so watered down that I'm not sure that it has the bite or the sting that would move the NCAA in the right direction. Everybody else...everybody, I think, I'm getting the feedback that it's just kind of, oh, ho-hum. I think that the body could look at this legislation and make an argument, and a viable argument, that the very first piece of the bill that came out would have had more bite and sting than this would. The NCAA, I have a feeling that the University of Nebraska is, and the NCAA is not quaking in its boots near as much as they would be had that first piece been what they were staring at right now. Now that's really all I had to say. I think we're talking about a philosophical difference, a slight philosophical difference, even though I both believe...or I mean I think that Senator Chambers, Senator Mossey, and I, and I think most everybody out here would believe that doing the right thing for the student athlete would be all of our common goals.
