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hope that everybody sees that my goal would be the same there, as well. But it's how we get there. I think the pressure is there. It's been...Senator Chambers passed out something earlier that said he is the biggest pain in the you-know-what to the NCAA in the last 30 years. Great! I just don't know if this legislation being passed would even have as much effect as him just being out there as a human being, as all of us being out there as human beings making these public officials and administrators, you know, hear these things. I mean, I guess the point is I think the damage has already been done, and I think...and I don't know that the NCAA would see this the same way as they would have seen the very first piece of legislation that was being proposed. So I guess I...the conclusion is, is that I don't support this legislation. I appreciate the time, and I return...I will yield time to anyone, Senator Chambers or anybody else, that might want it. If not, it's back to the Chair. Thanks.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Friend. Further discussion, Senator Tyson.

SENATOR TYSON: Thank you, Senator Cudaback, members of the body. I rise in support of this bill. I think this bill is cleverly drafted and effectively so. There is a phrase in the English language, the fifth column. This is a fifth column bill. During the Spanish Civil War, which was a vicious, hard-fought war in the 1930s, a prelude to World War II, there were four columns converging on a town to invest that town and conquer it. They were Republican columns, incidentally. And the man commanding that group, those four columns, said that he had four columns converging on the city, but within the city there was a fifth column more dangerous than the other four. This is a fifth column bill. We pass this bill, nothing happens. Another state legislature passes a similar bill, nothing happens. All four columns have to converge and then this bill goes into effect. I think that this bill points out a genuine injustice and a genuine weakness, and I urge you to support it. And, Senator Cudaback, if I may, I will give the rest of my time to Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Chambers, you're offered time again.
