county...or makes their recommendations to the county board, they could...they would write out the factual findings of why they advised them to accept or deny the permit. So it would help a little bit in...if it was taken to court that there was some factual reasons why they denied or why they granted the permit or why they advised them to do that. I think I've heard the last three applications across the state, all of them have been challenged in court. Two of them were applications that were granted and they were taken to court because there was a group felt like they should not have been granted, and also one was denied and that went to court also. So we thought this would be something that would be helpful if some factual findings that were written when they gave the recommendation to the county board. Then the county board then would also use those factual findings in their final determination in denying or approving the application. So that is the committee amendments, which become the bill. I think it's something that can really give some guidelines and some direction in the permits, and we heard many people...and I guess let me go back and say that it always seems like it has a...people think this is only for the mega hog operations, but I hear many times that some family farms are trying to expand and they've run into a lot of problems and the cost and finally they just say, I give up, I'm not going to do it. Many of the problems in agriculture right now I know have to do with profitability more than zoning, but this is just one step that can maybe help the situation out that we can promote agriculture which is so important in our state. The other day I read an article that said that we are now...Nebraska is number one in livestock slaughter, in processing in the nation, and if we don't have livestock production, it's pretty hard to stay up, and all the jobs that were...are associated with that, if you think of the trucking industry, the boxed beef industry. The...

And I thank, again, Senator Bromm and all those on the Ag Committee that have been...put a lot of time in it, and Senator Burling, for making this his priority bill. With that, I guess
