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does not change in substance anything that's in the committee amendment, and I would ask for your support of the amendment. And I will take this opportunity to go on and speak a little bit more about at least a vision that I have for the first part of the bill that talks about a livestock friendly county. And Senator Kremer mentioned this briefly as well, but the intent of that portion of the amendment is for the Department of Agriculture to establish a process whereby a county, if they chose to do so, if the county board chose to do so, to request that they be known or designated as a livestock friendly county. Some would say, well, all counties are livestock friendly. Well, that could be, but this is an opportunity for those that want to emphasize that activity or if someone wants to locate a facility or expand a facility in the state of Nebraska and they feel like they're not sure where to go or where they might be welcome, it at least gives a beginning point for the Department of Agriculture or the Department of Economic Development in our own state to say, well, here's a couple of counties that might have the good type of atmosphere and terrain and water and feed for the kind of facility you're interested in, so why don't you start there, or let's see how they might feel about it. And that is...that's the gist of it. The second part of that, and this came in, in the committee amendment portion after some further discussion. When counties are confronted with a special permit in this area, especially those that are fairly new to the zoning process, and there are a lot in Nebraska that are new to the zoning process, they're maybe overwhelmed by the application. What questions should we be asking? Is the applicant producer proposing the best methods of handling the waste or the odor problem, or is...or are they not? This would...this says that in order to assist the county with information and technology, the Department of Ag would provide...would establish a resource database to provide, upon written request from the county board or the zoning authority, information that might be useful in evaluating and crafting livestock facility conditional use permits that meet the objectives of the county and of the livestock producer applicant. I don't know if counties...it doesn't seem like counties, particularly those new to the process, know for sure where to turn to get help, and this would provide at least a database and information base that could result in them
