at Nebraska if we could convince them that we're not going to chase them out after they bought the land and gotten the permits and so on; that they could at least have some assurance. There are people out there that would defend what they're trying to do. We did that, but apparently we weren't as big enough a group and as vocal as the opponents out there in our particular county. I know we met with DEQ and even had a meeting with the Governor's...actually, the Governor and these people met one day and tried to convince them to stay in Nebraska and he said, we just...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR BAKER: ...we don't need this. He said, we...we'll take our business and our jobs to Kansas. And it's down north of Scott City, on the west side of the highway if you want to see the dairy. But I think this is a step in the right direction. We've had direct, personal involvement with what can happen out there in the country and if you can't find a place to build a dairy in Hitchcock County and consider it livestock friendly, I can imagine what it's like in other places, because we have some wide-open spaces out there. So I support the bill. I think that people that have opposed it out there in the country need to realize this is not the end of the world to zoning. It's simply trying to get the pendulum swung back a ways toward the center and let these people that are looking to locate in Nebraska, let them know that we are interested in continuing to work with them. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Baker. Senator Janssen, followed by nine others.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Thank you, Senator Cudaback. Members of the Legislature, oh, for years we've stood on this floor and talked about counties getting zoned. You have to zone your counties. Let's go. Let's get it done so you have some control over what is being placed in your counties. You know, and I, in my opinion, I guess there's only about four or five counties that haven't been zoned yet. My county, my district, is losing about 60 jobs because of a cheese processing plant in Dodge, Nebraska, you know, and in Dodge, Nebraska, 60 jobs is a pretty
