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that language was more appropriate to go into the Livestock Waste Management Act in Chapter 54, so that's the way the green copy was done. If you had been at the public hearing, you would have heard the word "zoning," which is what Chapter 3 (sic) is about, hundreds of times. There is no misimpression here about what people thought we were dealing with. People were absolutely feeling that we were trying to somehow change local zoning control, which is 180 degrees from the truth, and I think if you studied the amendment, you studied the bill and you heard the public hearing and you heard my statement of intent to the committee, my closing statement, my opening statement here, you, unless you don't believe any of that, you would have to agree that this is not about taking away local zoning control in any way, shape or form. And, Senator Janssen, I want to emphasize that with you. I stood here three or four years ago and I supported local zoning and I still do, but we have an economic crisis in this state that we all ought to be concerned about, and the crisis isn't just in the city limits of Lincoln or the city limits of Omaha. It's definitely out in rural Nebraska. There aren't jobs out there. People aren't coming back to the farm. And if you think you're going to have every farmer with 160 acres, 10-head of cattle, 50 hogs and 10 chickens, you have your head somewhere in the sand. That is not economically viable. If you've got a niche product that you can find and produce on a small scale you've got a shot, but there's only so much you can do with niche products and only so many of them. So if you're going to stay in livestock, the profits being what they are, you have to have some economies of scale. You have to. So for some it's a choice of either having a decent sized operation or having no operation at all. And I don't know, Senator McDonald, all the towns in your district and what's going on there, but I can't imagine that having more livestock production wouldn't be beneficial to your district. I cannot imagine that it would not be if it's done in an environmentally safe way. We're not going in here and doing anything to erode the Livestock Waste Management Act, that Senator Beutler worked so very hard on, and everyone on the Natural Resources Committee. We're not touching that. We're not lowering the standards at all. And to say, well, it's wrong to say that we want to have a livestock friendly designation, where are we at, folks? Where are we at? To have a promotion and a database in
