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SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Senator Hartnett. Thank you, Mr. President. And Senator Bromm, I think you missed the last part of my discussion. I was saying that if the bill is to do no more than what's in it, that's one thing. But...and I did object to the state making that declaration about livestock friendly. So that's something it does do to which I object, but I had also said, if it's the nose of the camel getting into the tent so that further down the line the Legislature, building on this language, which would be the law, can start restricting the prerogatives of these county boards and commissions to deny permits. There could first be a requirement that a statement or a decision be issued within a certain number of days or weeks. Then, a couple of years later, there could be a requirement that if the criteria set out by the county or the commission are met,...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...then a permit shall be granted. So I'm saying, if this is the first step of a journey whose destination I think is inappropriate, then the bill has to be viewed as more sinister than it appears on its face with the language it contains now. But even if that is not the purpose, I'm saying I think it is bad policy for the state to designate certain counties one way, which by that designation automatically is a disparagement upon every other county which does not receive that designation. So I hope that kind of clarifies my position a bit more. Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers and Senator Hartnett. Senator Wehrbein.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Mr. President, members of the body, first of all, I want to make a couple points. One, I strongly disagree with Senator Chambers and about the reason for this bill. To me, Senator Chambers' argument really makes the case for the bill. Frankly, most people across this country and in Nebraska don't want to make investments in the hundreds of thousands of dollars, if not millions, in areas that they're not wanted. So, in fact, if a statement comes out from a county planning
