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landowner or property owner within a ten-mile radius. So I guess my first question, Senator Bromm, is have I interpreted these sections correctly?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Bromm, will you yield?

SPEAKER BROMM: Yes, I would. Senator Raikes, there was a perception in Saunders County this summer, when your cattle were out, that there was a racetrack and it was around your feed yard. Is that...is that...(laughter)

SENATOR RAIKES: No further questions.

SPEAKER BROMM: They seemed to see you racing around the section trying to find these cattle, but nevertheless, a good question, Senator Raikes. What do you get out of it if you are designated a livestock friendly county? We haven't said anything about a certificate, but, in seriousness, I think what you get out of it is you...the county board, if they would seek such a designation by the passage, perhaps, of a resolution, would be making a statement that, hey, we're interested in working with producers here. We're going to make that statement and, believe it or not, the county, the Economic Development Department, and the Department of Agriculture do receive inquiries from producers wanting to know where it might be that they would have the best chance of locating a livestock facility, and I would assume that those counties would be some of the ones that they would encourage them to talk to.

SENATOR RAIKES: Okay. Well, let me accept that, and I think that is a good response to my question, but I want to make a specific suggestion to you and see if this has any appeal at all. Suppose when you go back to page 5...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR RAIKES: ...that you said that the final determination was for a livestock operation in a livestock friendly county, not any permitted use but a livestock operation and only in a livestock friendly county. And then, in addition, you limited those conditions, maybe not totally limit them, but basically
