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SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Hudkins.

SENATOR HUDKINS: Thank you, Mr. President and members of the body. I have been trying very hard to follow the discussion on this, this morning. There have been good reasons for and good reasons against, but I still keep going back to the point that I have not yet seen an instance where there has been a good reason to have this. There have not been, to my knowledge, conditional use permits that have been denied for inappropriate reasons. There were 45, in the counties that responded to a survey in this regard, there were 45 applications for conditional use permits processed; 40 were approved, 4 were rejected, and 1 was withdrawn. Now why were those four rejected? I would assume that they were for good reasons or someone on this floor would have told us why. And I would like to give the rest of my time to Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CUDABACK: You may have them, Senator Chambers, almost three and a half minutes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Mr. President. Thank you, "Wonder Woman." Mr. President and members of the Legislature, here is what I want to ask about this bill. Before I do that, I'd like to ask Senator Baker a question, if he is anywhere near.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Is Senator Baker available? I do not see him, Senator.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: This was with reference to something Senator Baker had said, so that's why I would have to ask the question of him. But as you go through this bill, following up on what Senator Hudkins said, exactly what is to be accomplished? If what I suggested is not accurate, and what I suggested is that this is just the first step toward reaching a point where the state can remove local control over zoning or granting of permits in this area. If that is not the purpose of this bill, the only thing I can see it doing is allowing a county, if it jumps through the hoops established by the Department of Agriculture, to be certified by the Department of Agriculture as a livestock friendly county. That's all that the bill will do
