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person--very subjective issues. So if there are counties that are willing to look beyond this and look to the future, and I still believe that this is a necessary thing to look at futuristically, we've got to decide are we a livestock friendly state, quote, or are we not? Are we going to continue to do this as long as at least livestock is viable as an agricultural enterprise? And whether we like all the things that are going to happen and will happen, I doubt if we all will, but as we move forward either we're going to be in the game. We're not going to be out of the game. And I'm very concerned that as our agriculture producers mature, if you will,...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: ...we're going to see several stopping off at this and we're not going to encourage new people coming in. And that's another part of the dilemma. How are we going to encourage young people coming out of college, those that are willing to take that risk and invest their money, how are they going to be willing to make those kinds of long-term investments? And that's where it's headed. They're not going to do that if they think that every corner they're going to run into opposition. After awhile you just give up. In fact, in my mind, that's what's happened, taking the drought out of it, but in that...in my mind, some of that is what's happened across the state. You finally give up because you see no hope. And part of that has to do with the size and scale, which once again is becoming subjective. I recognize that. But that's the reason I believe that this would serve a purpose, having a designation for those counties that do want it. And if they don't want it, they don't have to play the game.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Wehrbein. Senator McDonald.

SENATOR McDONALD: I'd like to give my time to Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Chambers.
