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and so "may" seemed to be appropriate at that time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay. You erased the difficulty that I had there. You had said that if this amendment of mine is adopted, it would tear your heart out. Would it tear the heart out of the bill?

SPEAKER BROMM: It would severely damage one or two chambers. I would say that. (Laughter)

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: (Laugh) I can't top it anyway.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Chambers, you have...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I will close. If...is there nobody with a light on?

SENATOR CUDABACK: There are no lights on.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Then I will use this opportunity to close. I don't think that my amendment is going to be adopted. But I'm going to take a vote on it. I will say as long as we're discussing this bill that it is inappropriate for the state to do this. We don't even know where this designation is going to be placed. There is nothing that would prohibit a county from self-describing itself right now as a livestock friendly county. I'd like to ask Senator Burling a question, because he's standing there doing nothing but looking very, very interested.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Burling.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Burling, if you'd like to answer a question?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Would you respond, Senator Burling?

SENATOR BURLING: Yes.
