just as well. That's one of the things I like about the bill and the livestock friendly designation, at least people know that you're going to work with them positively rather than negatively. And whether we like it or not, that's part of the dilemma in this issue is whether you're for or against. And so I'm going to continue to vote opposed. I don't guess... I guess, since it's General File, we'll be all right if we move forward at Select, if this needs to be refined. But I'm concerned that this is not a standardized request, if you will, on the amount of information that's requested, such as we see in a DEQ permit at this time.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Thank you, Senator Wehrbein. Seeing no further lights, Senator Beutler, would you like to close on AM1200?

SENATOR BEUTLER: Senator Schimek, members of the Legislature, we should figure out what it is we're trying to do here. I mean, if what we're trying to do is cut the county out from making any environmental determinations of any type, then you can cut off their right to information, and they'll have a hard time doing that. But that's not what everybody is saying is the purpose of this bill. The purpose of the bill is to get the information determinations up front, to get to the county the information it needs so that it can make its determinations and set its conditions. This amendment doesn't add anything to what everybody is telling me are the perceived prerogatives of the county. This is making it clear. And I think the counties would feel comfortable with this, and able to proceed in good faith to set their conditions and make a final determination up front, before the DEQ application. The...if I'm right in perceiving, and if everyone is being honest as to the purpose of this bill, this amendment adds very little, except the clarification that the county can ask for whatever information it needs to make whatever determinations are within the prerogatives of the county. That's all it says. And in some cases, they're going to want site-specific information, I'm sure. After all, it's hard to determine whether you need monitor wells, or what you may need in a particular location, if they don't know the location and they don't know what's intended. There is a degree of information that has to be
