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straightforwardness.        The next round of questions are going to go back to the bill itself, because there is one point I haven't made my way to yet that I'm working up to.

SENATOR CUDABACK:    Time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS:    Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK:    Thank you, Senator Chambers.        Senator Byars...

SENATOR BYARS:        Thank you, Senator...

SENATOR CUDABACK:    ...followed by...

SENATOR BYARS:        Thank you, Senator Cudaback.        Senator Chambers, we can continue the dialogue, if you would like.

SENATOR CHAMBERS:    All right.        Senator Byars, nobody under this bill really is required to get the vaccination, as you pointed out in your discussion, because the student, if he or she is an adult, can sign the waiver.        If the person is a minor, the parents can sign the waiver.        So it is possible that nobody will receive a vaccination as a result of this bill.

SENATOR BYARS:        That is correct.

SENATOR CHAMBERS:    If that were to happen, the threat remains out there unaddressed.        Is that true?

SENATOR BYARS:        That is correct.

SENATOR CHAMBERS:    If you believe the threat is real and you believe it is out there, why not put something on the books, if you're going to do it all, that would mandate the vaccinations?

SENATOR BYARS:        I think, as we all know, baby steps sometimes are more effective in this type of issue.        And I would prefer to at least be able to get the education process to all of the students who are coming into this type of situation.        I feel if families and if students, as they're exposed to the very tragic
