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consequence of this disease, as they're educated, that they will make that choice themselves. Maybe we could equate that somewhat, even, Senator, with our ongoing dialogue about seat belts.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But this...

SENATOR BYARS: You feel education...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Oh, excuse me.

SENATOR BYARS: ...you feel education...we can continue to educate people to continue to wear their seat belts from education. I have long felt that sometimes we need to mandate that. Have I been successful in that effort?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Not with me.

SENATOR BYARS: That is correct.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But we're talking about an infectious disease here. Your associating with me does not cause you to cease wearing your seat belt. If I had this disease and we had contact, you very well could come down with it.

SENATOR BYARS: That is correct.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Is AIDS a very deadly disease?

SENATOR BYARS: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Is it transmissible from one person to another?

SENATOR BYARS: Yes, it is.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Is it sexually transmitted?

SENATOR BYARS: That is one way that it can be transmitted, yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Do you believe that students on a college
