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does, if nothing else, implies a club, if you will, on the students who are enrolled.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Senator Byars. Mr. President, members of the Legislature, what Senator Byars just said gives even more reason why this bill ought to be killed. There should be nothing coercive from the state on these students. Nothing should be suggested that by virtue of your living in these dormitories...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...there is a greater club that the state can hold over your head to compel you to get this vaccination. I think it is unwise. I think it is bad policy. And we're not talking about little children who are entering school for the first time and may infect all of their little classmates. We are talking about young adults. They can make decisions. And they make bad decisions every day. And old adults make bad decisions every day. This bill, if enacted into law, will be a bad decision, in my opinion. This bill has not been shown by Senator Byars to be needed. There are a lot of things I wish people would pay attention to. I just wish all my colleagues would wash their hands when they get through in the bathroom. But I can't make them do that. And that's why I won't eat any of this candy and stuff that is handed out around here, besides...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...the fact that people breathe on it.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. You've heard the opening on the motion by Senator Chambers to indefinitely postpone LB 513, introduced by Senator Byars. Open for discussion on that motion to indefinitely postpone. Senator Byars, followed by Senator Chambers. Senator Byars.
