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they do it, but you have children still in the home, still under the parents' tutelage and dominance, if you will, and there is a different relationship at that level between the parents and the child, often, than between the parent and the child when the child is at the university. There is also a different relationship between the parents and the high school than between the parents and the university. So this amendment that is being offered I think is very wise. It is bringing us closer and closer to addressing the problem that this bill is seeking to make us aware of. So I support this amendment, and I hope others will too.

**SPEAKER BROMM:** Senator Chambers, were you complete? Thank you. Senator Bourne.

**SENATOR BOURNE:** Thank you, Mr. President, members. I'm sitting here and I'm thinking, when are we going to stop? (Laugh) You know, Senator Byars had an idea. And I wasn't...I happened to be in a meeting the day that we voted it out. I don't know if I would have voted the bill out, to be quite honest with you. But I mean, Senator Redfield, I appreciate your concern, but, you know, I had a three-year-old niece that had meningitis. So what do we do now? I mean, Senator Byars looked at the statistics. He felt that the biggest group was those individuals in college. Although certainly, we...every one of us probably knows somebody else at any age that has had this. But when do you stop? I mean, we can't be all things to all people. And we've gotten to the point here in this Legislature, anyway, that we are so concerned with trying to protect everyone that I'm not sure that we're doing any good at all. And I'm getting to the point where I'm not going to support any of this. So I don't know what the answer is. But I mean, we can't protect everybody. Three-year-olds get this just as 19- and 20-year-olds do. So I don't know what I'm going to do with Senator Redfield's amendment, even though I certainly appreciate it. Senator Chambers has got some good points. I just am to the point where I'm not sure that we can...we cannot protect everyone. Senator Chambers, if you'd like the balance of my time, you're welcome to it.

**SPEAKER BROMM:** Thank you, Senator Bourne. Senator Chambers.
