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SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, if you don't agree with the information being given, then I see no point in the bill at all, because that's all the bill mandates. But it also has that "cloudy" information or material about a mandated vaccine...

SENATOR BOURNE: My point is...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...vaccination.

SENATOR BOURNE: Sure. My point is, is that we've gotten to the point where we feel like we have to protect everyone. I would tell you that probably there are more kids that fall off their Big Wheels and get injured than infants that get meningitis.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Right. But the results are not nearly as devastating. Would you support...

SENATOR BOURNE: I don't disagree with that.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Would you support killing the bill then?

SENATOR BOURNE: Well, I don't know. I don't know if I'm to the point where I would vote to do that. I will tell you that I was concerned with kids going to college and not having the money for the vaccine. And I introduced that amendment simply to do that. And I don't...on one hand, I don't see the harm with the bill. On the other hand, you know, my question is...and this is philosophical...where do you stop? When do we stop protecting, or trying to protect everyone?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: We stop with my and Senator Redfield's amendment. That's where we stop.

SENATOR BOURNE: (Laugh) That was a surprising answer. I'm sorry I asked.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Chambers. While the Legislature is in session and capable of transacting business, I
