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have to have an insurance card to...in order to get that license. However, immediately after getting the vehicle licensed, they'll drop their insurance. The same thing can happen, not only on the automobile or the motorcycle insurance, but also the long-term care insurance. So we don't have any justification to say that this insurance will be maintained. It's just a matter of what will happen. One other issue that comes to mind is that every young person, they're...one of the things that they're striving to be, more than anything else, is an adult. They act like adults, they want to look like adults, and they'll do what adults do. I have in my hand here the "Nebraska Adolescents Major Causes of Premature Death and Disability." This is published once a year by the Nebraska Health and Human Services System. In that...and it talks about the various risk activities that children and young people partake in. Forty-four percent rode in a car during the past 30 days with someone who had been drinking alcohol; 25 percent drove a motor vehicle after drinking alcohol during the past 30 days. Got a whole list of things, probably around 20 items. One of them, however, is 35 percent of those who rode a motorcycle during the last 12 months never, rarely wore a helmet. And so you have young people trying to act like adults, who also, even though the bill says that anyone under 22...I believe it's 22...or 21 must wear a helmet. But you're going to have a lot of kids out there who are going to act like adults and be without the helmets and then get into the accidents...

SPEAKER BROMM: One minute.

SENATOR JENSEN: ...also. I would just appeal to you. This is certainly not a bill that we ought to enact at this time. Not when this state is facing major, major budget shortfalls, and not when our Medicaid costs are growing up at 14.5 percent per year. We don't need one more item to increase those costs to the state, to our citizens, by repealing this helmet law, which, yes, has reduced deaths, and it also has reduced a number of people who would have been severely injured and had long-term injuries. I've worked with the brain trauma...
