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Education Act, and after January 1, a course under...I mean, I don't get what the differences in these two acts are.

SENATOR SMITH: We needed time to get the infrastructure, the training infrastructure, ready for an increased interest, an increase in interest. So that's why we had to do the January 1, 2005.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Okay. Well, okay, I'll try to find the previous act and see what...if there's any differences. Then, as we move on down,...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: ...onto page 17, it's Section (3). It says: A person shall be exempt from subsection (1) of this section if he or she is...or she was born prior to January 1, 1984, which would mean you were about 19 years old, I guess, is equipped with eye protection, and carries proof of health insurance coverage equivalent or exceeding standards. And then it doesn't say anything further about the Motorcycle Safety Education Act as it does in subsection (2). I may not be reading this right, but I just don't understand what's being achieved here.

SENATOR SMITH: Okay, those born prior to January 1, 1984, when everything is ready to go with this bill, and it's on line, and January 1, 2005, comes, they are 21 years old.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: But this is...okay, this has an...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: ...emergency clause attached to it.

SENATOR SMITH: So that the funds can be generated so as to pay for it because it is...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Schimek, your time is up. I'm sorry. Senator Price, followed by Senator Janssen and others. Senator Price is not currently with us. Senator Janssen.
