SENATOR VRTISKA: Okay. Well, I'm not trying to be critical. I'm just trying to get a feel of this whole piece of legislation. I have reservations about both ways. I've heard lots of testimony why we should do away with the helmet bill, and of course I've had many people who contacted me who don't like it because of the inability to see and the inability to hear. And Senator Byars indicated that that's a fallacy, that it's not correct. And I've heard other people who give lots of testimony why we should have a...or why we should not have a helmet or why we should have a helmet, and of course it becomes an issue that all of us are concerned about. I rode a motorcycle when I was young, like Senator Janssen, and didn't know any better. Had a couple of accidents where I didn't get hurt, but I understand that a motorcycle is a more dangerous piece of conveyance than an automobile is. At the same time, of course, because of the numbers, lots more people are killed in automobiles. And I guess the question was posed to Senator Pedersen and I would like to ask the same question, is why that won't be included in...and if we can pass that kind of legislation to require on the motorcycle, why can't we pass the...

SPEAKER BROMM: One minute.

SENATOR VRTISKA: ...same kind of legislation if you drive an automobile? Now I recognize that when you get to my age probably nobody would want my organs, but there are a lot of people out there who would be willing to accept organs for their family or for themselves if there was some available, and of course we all know there aren't that many organs available. But I guess there's those kind of questions that are still out there
