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severely, not so much as someone else. With a motor vehicle you're always endangering someone else's life also, not that that couldn't happen. The terrible accident that happened in Omaha just the other day, you know, that, thank goodness there was someone close by with a chest of ice or...I haven't heard any reports on how that poor young man is getting along, that his arm was severed, but hopefully, hopefully, he's doing fine. But I think that the helmet for two years that you should have to have some training. Those first two years are very important, very important in learning how to ride a bike. But anyway, I just want you to know, Senator Beutler, that I think you've struck upon something here that is very important and I am going to support your amendment. With that, I'll give the rest of my time back to the Chair, Senator Cudaback.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Janssen. Senator Bourne.

SENATOR BOURNE: Thank you, Mr. President, members. Senator Beutler, would you yield to a question just for clarification purposes?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Beutler, will you yield?

SENATOR BEUTLER: You bet.

SENATOR BOURNE: What you're proposing to do is make everyone go through a training course whether or not they're a new rider or a rider with, say, 20 years of experience, is that pretty much in a nutshell, if they want to go without a helmet?

SENATOR BEUTLER: I think that's pretty much it in a nutshell, yes.

SENATOR BOURNE: Okay. You know, I have no trouble with the training, but my question to you is this. Is Senator...I think it's Adrian Smith, I can't read his writing up here in the...it's District 48. Is that Adrian's? Okay. Senator Smith had handed out a sheet here that talks about Nebraska motorcycle registrations and licensed drivers, and he has indicated here that there's 26,792. Is that licensed motorcycle drivers in the state? And I guess what my question would be is if what we are
