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going to do is to say that they didn't have to have a helmet but they had to go through this training, do you have any idea of, like, our capacity for training right now, how many people it can do in one year or one month or...?

SENATOR BEUTLER: Senator, I have no idea. I assume we're going to be rapidly expanding our ability to do that and so probably some folks would have to continue to wear a helmet until they can get through it.

SENATOR BOURNE: Maybe I could ask Senator Smith a question or two.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Smith, are you available for a question? I do not see Senator Smith. Senator Smith, will you...he says he can't speak right now, Senator.

SENATOR BOURNE: He can't speak right now. (Laugh) I thought it was his bill. I'm sorry.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Smith, are you available?

SENATOR SMITH: I thought it was my turn to speak.

SENATOR BOURNE: Senator Smith, you had passed out a document indicating there's some 26,700 licensed motorcycle drivers in the state. Is that...am I reading this correctly?

SENATOR SMITH: Which sheet do you refer to?

SENATOR BOURNE: Well, what I'm trying to get at, Senator Smith, is that Senator Beutler has recommended that everyone who wants to go without a helmet has to take a training course before they can do so, and it seems to me if we have tens of thousands of licensed motorcyclists here the state, it's going to take years for us to get these people through training. Is that an accurate statement?

SENATOR SMITH: That is conceivable, yes.

SENATOR BOURNE: What is our capacity for training now?
