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It, rather, pays out money to providers to do that training.

SENATOR SMITH: Contracts, yes.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Yes. Did the committee amendment, when it increased fees, take care of the money that the state had to pay out of its General Funds? In other words, do we now raise it through the fee that...

SENATOR SMITH: Yes.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Okay. So that if we have people taking additional training, we have additional people paying into the fund, so conceivably that money should pay for the training?

SENATOR SMITH: Right. Now, it's speculative on...well, it's speculative how many people will go without a helmet entirely. That's speculative.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: That's true. That's true.

SENATOR SMITH: It is speculative how many will take the course and still wear a helmet. I'll leave the helmet issue...

SENATOR SCHIMEK: That's true.

SENATOR SMITH: ...aside for training purposes. But the practical implication is would there be a far greater demand with that many more, as Senator Bourne characterized, 50-some thousand people? Now, if they all wanted to take it...

SENATOR SCHIMEK: And they wouldn't.

SENATOR SMITH: ...it would be problematic.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: I can't imagine that all of them would want to take it.

SENATOR SMITH: Right. I want to adjourn here in a few minutes and hopefully sit down with some folks to see what would be workable.
