SENATOR SMITH: They'll have training associated with that. I mean the law enforcement will be trained in that.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Well, even though they have a lot of training, if there is...I mean they'll have a list of all the organizations in the country that provide these kinds of courses? I mean even in our academic standards and whenever we do any sort of education endeavor or certify an education establishment, either there is some methodology for certification or at least approval of certain institutions who historically have given good tests or good courses, and some approval by some state agency. I mean, all of our licensing tests, I think, have to be approved by some state agency. Is this test going to be approved...it's not going to be approved by any state agency?

SENATOR SMITH: I'm sorry?

SENATOR BEUTLER: Is it...would it be true that this test that they take or this course that they're taking with respect to who gives it would not have to be approved by any state agency?

SENATOR SMITH: Well, there are a lot of standards here, and if we can be more specific, I'm open to that. Would you...it's not typical that a nonagency is referenced in statute. That's my understanding. I haven't searched every statute to discover that, but it's my understanding that to reference a foundation that is not an agency, specific government agency, is not typical.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay.

SENATOR SMITH: If...

SENATOR BEUTLER: Oh, I can understand that, but that's not my original suggestion.
