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SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Byars. Senator Johnson, followed by Senator Smith and others.

SENATOR JOHNSON: Senator Cudařack, members of the body, a pretty hard act to follow in those three, but I'd like to at least give it a shot. Senator Smith, you made the statement that more research is needed. Yesterday, you brought up the fact, in fact I think you had a helmet that had a sticker on it. Can you relate what that sticker said?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Smith, would you respond.

SENATOR SMITH: Yes. It says that no helmet, not some helmets, no helmet can protect the user against all foreseeable impacts.

SENATOR JOHNSON: I would call your attention to the fact that there is a similar sticker on football helmets. Should we make an amendment to do away with football helmets on all of the players playing football in the state of Nebraska as well? After all, the sticker doesn't guarantee that you will be safe.

SENATOR SMITH: Can I talk about that?

SENATOR JOHNSON: Let me talk about a few other things. I can understand when we talk about, yes, it's great to ride the Harley and the hair...the wind is blowing through your hair. I'm sure it's a great feeling. I can even appreciate that we might have an economic stimulus by the number of motorcycles that we would have, the tourists going through here, those sort of things. But what I really got up to talk about was this. Yesterday, in quoting medical experts, it seemed to me that it was awfully easy for you to take all of the major research institutions in the United States, which are the world-class research institutions, and dismiss their research as if it didn't count. The American College of Surgeons Trauma Committee, the American Trauma Society, Emergency Physicians, College of Pediatrics, the neurosurgeons, College of Orthopedic Surgeons, and I mention that one particularly because the person, your expert that you quoted is an orthopedic surgeon, an orthopedic surgeon, as your consultant for head injuries.
