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you do, and how are things going, blah, blah, blah. And he said to me, well, you know, Nance, motorcycles and guns keep me driving a Mercedes. So when the...and it just stuck in my head because isn't that sad? Isn't that sad? And here we have an opportunity to not reverse some of the motorcycle issues and keep people safer, and we should defeat this bill for this reason, but we should put the amendment on for this reason, because if we're going to grant a privilege on our property, our roads, then we can set the parameters, and we don't want to do things that are going to cost us more money. And I've been offended by...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR THOMPSON: ...the discussion about...pardon me?

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute, I'm sorry.

SENATOR THOMPSON: ...about Dr. Manion and some of the leaders in our...from our medical perspective. They have nothing to gain by this bill except the health of people in Nebraska and the safety of people in Nebraska. And to refer to them as activists isn't quite the same to me. I think they're exercising their responsibility that they took when they took up the profession of medicine to try to keep people as healthy and safe as they can be. And I respect that. Now I respect the fact that some people want to drive around with the wind blowing through their hair. I respect that, and those are the activists on the other side. And when Senator Smith said he doesn't talk to activists, I'm just guessing that he has talked to a few of those people and that he's talked to the ABATE people, and they have a right to come in and try to pass this bill. But I don't think we should negate what our medical community in Nebraska is...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time.

SENATOR THOMPSON: ...telling us. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Thompson. Senator Vrtiska, followed by Senator Erdman and others.
