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between \$4.1 and \$9 million a year? The proponents of this bill have...the only statistic that they seem to be citing from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration as acceptable is the one that says that nonhelmeted users are more...I mean nonhelmeted motorcyclists involved in crashes are more likely to be using alcohol, and I guess that that also says to me that maybe this...the behavior is not particularly responsible. But there is, within those National Highway Traffic Safety Administration studies, indication that motorcyclists are...nonhelmeted motorcyclists are three times more likely to have brain trauma. Now, if we are dismissing those statistics, then I will point to the actual Nebraska statistics provided by the BryanLGH Trauma Center. The deaths, actually, from Bryan were less for helmeted than for nonhelmeted, but brain trauma was 9 percent for helmeted, 56 percent for nonhelmeted, that's five times as many, and that these individuals are much less likely to have insurance. The helmeted individuals, none of them were Medicaid eligible. The nonhelmeted individuals, 11 percent were Medicaid eligible. Now we may be making light of this, but this is...ultimately we are making choices about whether individuals, moderate-income individuals who were eliminated from the children's health insurance program have the opportunity to give their children vitamins and immunization versus whether we're going to take a situation, make it three to five times more likely for people to have brain trauma, and then have them be on Medicaid and be paying for it between \$4.1 million and \$9 million a year. And so this is...it may sound awful, but those are the kinds of choices that we are making, and if I have to choose between something that's going to prevent three to five times as many head trauma and be able to provide care for young children, I would choose to provide the care for young children. And I will yield the rest of my time to Senator Brashear.

SENATOR CUDABACK: You have about one minute and a half, Senator Brashear, if you care to use it.

SENATOR BRASHEAR: Thank you, Mr. President, members of the body. Thank you, Senator Brown. Having been enlightened by the debate, while it wasn't my...I hadn't really critically thought about this, it wasn't my original intent, it's clear to me that
