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your...you know, put me on your do-not-call list, and I get another call from them, it's because the industry, or not the industry but the particular business is either avoiding or dropping the ball in that arena. Is that correct?

SENATOR SMITH: Yes, that is correct.

SENATOR FRIEND: Well, we can separate this type of behavior from fraudulent behavior. I've seen some of the information that's been handed out where we're talking about a bill like this can move us or help us alleviate some fraudulent behavior. I guess I'm a little curious as to how that would happen. I mean, fraudulent behavior does not adhere to these no-call lists whether the business happens to adhere to them or forgets or drops the ball on some of these things. I mean, is there a connection there or am I missing something?

SENATOR SMITH: I'm sorry, the connection between...?

SENATOR FRIEND: I probably didn't...

SENATOR SMITH: Not all telemarketers are fraudulent, certainly.

SENATOR FRIEND: I guess what I'm saying is just because a business makes a mistake, the do-not-call list, we've established that the do-not-call list is out there. The businesses are establishing those. Am I to assume that if the...that there's fraudulent behavior associated with that? I mean, where are we making the connection with the fraudulent behavior and the business is just missing, you know, the boat on some of these procedures? There is no connection, is there?

SENATOR SMITH: No.

SENATOR FRIEND: The fraudulent behavior, to me, would be somebody calling me up and saying that they're collecting money for the sheriffs society and there is no sheriffs society, correct?

SENATOR SMITH: Correct.
