SENATOR CUDABACK: Would you respond, Senator Chambers?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes. All I've been told is that perhaps sometime next year, and I don't have a date.

SENATOR JENSEN: Okay. Well, we did 200 homes last year...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes.

SENATOR JENSEN: ...at \$2 million. It would appear that the \$300,000 would do another 30 homes for this next year.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: It's just a stopgap, that's all. And had I been contacted by the people in Omaha earlier, perhaps I would be taking a different approach, but I have to get what I can while I can. And if the stopgap turns out to be not that, meaning no federal money comes, then I would make sure that a broader based approach is taken than something like what is being asked for here. But that's about all I can tell you at this point.

SENATOR JENSEN: Okay. Well, thank you. You know, I think that this does properly belong in the Environmental Trust Fund. Like I said, it is an environmental issue. I'm sorry, but I'll take the kids as a priority over animals and waterfowl and some of the other things. And we've done a great job with the environment and with that trust fund, don't get me wrong, but as far as when I got to set priorities, I'm afraid it's going to be back with the kids. And so I think that this is a proper place to take the dollars. We transfer it to the education, and it looks like now it's going to come out of the General Fund. I would rather see it, as Senator Bourne had mentioned, back in the Environmental Trust Fund dollars. With that, I'll return the rest. Senator Chambers, do you need some time? I'll turn the rest of my time back over to Senator Chambers.
