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with them? Except that if I carry a gun, people are going to know it. And it may not be one with a barrel of only 16 inches. I can carry a shotgun any time I want to. I can carry a rifle any time I want to. And I would hate to have to be patrolling my community because white people who are armed are coming through my community. Then Senator Mossey will say,...

SPEAKER BROMM: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...I had nothing to do with that. Senator Tyson would say the same, and everybody else on this floor who support this bill. You all need to know some of the realities. And when you are aware, as I am, of the racism in the Omaha Police Union, you'll understand why I can't stand on this floor and say I put a lot of credence in the position they take on anything. I'm out of time. I wish I had some more. But Mr. Speaker, thank you.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Hartnett.

SENATOR HARTNETT: Mr. Speaker, members of the body, I think what happened with the police association, from my perspective, is that they thought the bill would simply not advance. Because I've heard from them since the bill advanced, especially from my Sarpy County Sheriffs' Association, Senator Mossey. And you live in Sarpy County. They're very, very definitely opposed to this. We're not in the community that Senator Chambers is in, but they're in Sarpy County. And we are affected in Sarpy County by the greater...the other community that's north of us. And they're definitely against it. We see lots of problems with the bill, with the thing, with more guns. Lots of accidents, and so forth. So the police people that I hear in my community are definitely against concealed guns. Maybe your community where you live, Senator Mossey, is different than mine. But I live in Sarpy County, and they're against it, from what I've heard. They were surprised that it advanced. So I think...and I think they depended upon the gentleman that sits to my front and a little bit to my left to keep it from advancing. But that didn't happen. Senator Chambers, would you like some time? I'm done. But I think in my county, what I hear from my law enforcement people, they're definitely against advancement of
