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concealed...Senator Tyson's bill. I'll give the rest of my time to Senator Chambers.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Hartnett. You have a little over three minutes, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Senator Hartnett. Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Before I start, I want to ask Senator Tyson if he'd like pose that question to me that he just did. Senator Tyson,...

SPEAKER BROMM: Senator Tyson.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...would you like to pose that question to me?

SPEAKER BROMM: Senator Tyson.

SENATOR TYSON: What question was that, Senator Chambers?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: About 50th and Underwood? I don't mind the question.

SENATOR TYSON: Oh, no, I'll continue that conversation with you in...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Oh, okay. I thought you said you wanted to...okay, good. Then I won't even bring it up. But I wanted to give you the opportunity. Members of the...and that's a side issue that Senator Tyson and I had. Members of the Legislature, this is one of the most serious bills we're dealing with. It deals literally with life or death. Now, Senator Mossey wants to talk about police officers in the union. He says you should disregard the sheriffs. He said...now, he didn't say that yet, because he just now found out that they're opposed to the bill. But he did say the organization of police chiefs should not be given much credence because they're officially against this bill. Because he said there are more rank and file officers than there are chiefs. But these police officers he's talking about have not come out in favor of the bill. They're neutral.
