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Why don't you want it in bars or taverns? Why? You got a guy who can drive. He can put it in his coat and walk out to his pickup truck, and leave the pistol in the truck, go in the bar and get drunk, come back out and get that pistol and legally have it and legally put it under his coat, in his pocket. And he is a drunk, armed and dangerous, and that can happen. But does Senator Mossey care? No. Does Senator Tyson care? No. Senator Aguilar? No. Even my good friend Senator Combs doesn't care. Arm the drunks. But I do care. The police chiefs care. The sheriffs care. And the sheriffs have a more direct reason for caring. I'd like to ask Senator Brashear a question, because he is a lawyer, and he's a practicing lawyer, and he's a good lawyer, and he is a rich lawyer. (Laughter)

SPEAKER BROMM: Senator Brashear.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Brashear, would you like to see drunks carrying concealed weapons on the street?

SENATOR BRASHEAR: Mr. Speaker? Senator Chambers, can I just digress for just one minute?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes you may.

SENATOR BRASHEAR: You could address all those accusations and whatever to the Speaker. Would you pick on him next time? (Laughter)

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Oh, is he rich?

SENATOR BRASHEAR: Absolutely.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay. But while he's in the Chair, I can't...he has immunity while he's in the Chair.

SENATOR BRASHEAR: All right.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And Senator Brashear, I don't know if you heard the example that I gave. So in order that you'll know why I bring that up: you can't have these guns in bars and taverns, but a person could carry it out of the house, leave it in his or
