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doesn't say that you have to know A from bullfrog.

SPEAKER BROMM: Time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

SENATOR TYSON: Is that the one you used to wake me up?

SENATOR THOMPSON: That's when I used to wake you up.

SENATOR TYSON: Okay. Yes.

SENATOR THOMPSON: Okay. Do you remember hearings that we sat through, hearing...not to overdo the "hearing" thing, I guess...about databases at the Department of Health and Human Services?

SENATOR TYSON: I don't recall that, no.
