SENATOR MOSSEY: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Mossey, on that issue, what is it that you said you would bring back?

SENATOR MOSSEY: How they came about their position.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay. Thank you. And that...I don't want to overstate what you said. Senator Mossey is going to bring back information showing how the head of the union determined the position of the membership. And I'm saying it was a hunch. Do you know how we determine what the attitude of this body is on a bill? A vote is taken. And that is how we determine it. Any other thing is just words spoken, that sometimes senators abide by, sometimes they do not. Because people are changeable. Because there can be intervening factors between the time a person on this floor tells us they feel a certain way about a bill and when they vote, some of us do not count votes until they appear on the board. Until a person votes, that person is free to change his or her vote. After putting a vote, that person is free to change his or her vote until the vote is called by the Clerk. I don't believe that the head of the police union did anything to determine the feeling of the membership. I don't believe there were any union stewards who were sent out to determine the attitude and the feeling of those officers over whom that person was a steward, or who were served by that person as a steward. I don't believe any of those expedencies were resorted to.

SPEAKER BROMM: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: When Senator Mossey comes back and gives us the information, you're going to see that hunches are being asked to be relied on. Somebody had a hunch about how somebody else felt. I think I've probably said as much as I need to on Senator Tyson's A bill. I'm not going to offer any amendments to it. I'm not going to take a vote on my motion. So I would ask of the Chair, Mr. Speaker, are there any other lights on?
