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meetings, and I have said constantly, we need to reduce the size of government. And here we are, growing government in the times of the greatest fiscal crisis we've ever had in the history of this state. Now, two people isn't much, I agree. Eighty-some thousand dollar additional cost to the federal...or, to the Public Service Commission, it isn't much money. But come on. When does it stop? Two people here, two people here, five people here. They're all not many people. But pretty soon, pretty soon, if we don't stop, we're going to have a budget crisis of about \$800 million. Oh, I forgot. We do. We're here because of bills like this. We are having a budget crisis because of bills like this. This isn't the straw that broke the camel's back. But these kinds of bills are why we're here. It's amazing to me that some of the...two of the most conservative senators in this body are bringing a bill like this that is classic big daddy government that knows best. This is the most paternalistic thing I have ever seen, by two of our most conservative members. And I...when Senator Baker says, well, we've got it all worked out, trust me, pass this over to Select File; trust? Trust me? It doesn't make any sense. The federal government is going to take care of this for us. For once, let's use a little common sense. Let's let the federal government take care of this for us, instead of us trying to save the world. When Senator Baker says that it's taken care of, move it over to Select and we'll find a solution; well, I think the solution is here already. It's looking us right between the eyes. And it's the federal government's establishment of a no-call list. Let's let them do it. What's the urgency? Thank you, Mr. President.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Bourne. (Visitors introduced.) Senator Baker.

SENATOR BAKER: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I can appreciate what Senator Bourne is saying here, to some degree. Common sense, trust us. In the federal level, we have, and that's why we have this bill here. Senator Beutler so aptly pointed out yesterday, the states have put the pressure on the federal government, or we'd never be where they are in the federal level.
