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telephone solicitation, page 2, Section 7, it does include charitable contributions. A lot of high schools and grade schools and private institutions and nonprofit organizations in Omaha. I...would this subject these type of organizations to penalties under this?

SENATOR SMITH: There is some question about that. And that's why I've agreed to look at...or, consider charitable organizations or nonprofit organizations, if they want to call their members,...that there must be an affiliation. It might be alumni status. So that, you know, what we're ending up addressing is the big commercial operator calling elderly people because they know they're more likely to give.

SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: And I agree with that intent, Senator Smith. And...but my problem with it at this point is including charitable contribution within the telephone solicitation definition. I got a definitional problem. Because I...for instance, like a Mercy High School in Omaha. If they have some kind of phone solicitation to raise some money. I would not be in favor of the potential of them being subject to civil penalties to have some type of fund raiser for the high school. So that's a concern I have. And if you'd be willing to work to exempt that type of activity out of the bill, I'd be more open to this proposal. Are you in fact open to exempting that type of activity out of the bill?

SENATOR SMITH: Yes I am.

SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: Okay. Thank you. I will give the rest of my time to Senator "Corn."

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Senator Bourne, you have three minutes.

SENATOR BOURNE: Thank you, Madam President. Thank you, Senator "Synowhiskey." I just wanted to clarify Senator Smith's comments. If you look at the committee statement, the green copy of the bill says that residential subscribers pay \$5 for inclusion on the no-call list. So the green copy would require anyone who wanted to be placed on the no-call list to pay \$5. I don't know if it would be on their phone bill or not. Senator
