SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Beutler. Senator Brashear.

SENATOR BRASHEAR: Mr. Speaker, members of the body, I endorse Senator Beutler's comments, and I rise in support of his amendment. I think this is, again, part of the grinding and polishing that improves the bill. And I would urge the adoption of the amendment. Thank you.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, me too. Thank you.

SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: Mr. Speaker, I can't support the amendment. I think it just adds another layer to the sanctions. Senator Beutler, if I could ask you a question?

SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: Let me...just, real practical question. What if the chief probation officer is out on vacation? I mean, there's no indication of the chief probation officer and his or her designee, for example. What if they're on a two-week vacation?

SENATOR BEUTLER: Senator, I suppose you'd have to get in contact with them in one way or another. I assume they're always within contact of the office, for a variety of reasons, in that position. Would they not be?

SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: I just think you need a provision in there, his or her designee, in case they're not available to sign off on an administrative sanction order. And again, my concern with
