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But there's another song that says none are so blind as those who will not see. None are so deaf as those who will not hear. So before this whole thing takes a direction that may not be the best direction to go in at this time in the session, I feel that, as the dean of the Legislature, I must exercise some responsibility and prerogatives. And I see somebody is bowing to me in homage. Before I say more than is necessary, I'm going to let there be a little discussion of that motion to see where we wind up being, because it's what you can call a hold-harmless motion. It's not an attempt to amend, not an attempt to strike the clause, the enactment clause or anything like that. Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. You've heard the opening on the bracket motion. Open for discussion. Senator Jensen.

SENATOR JENSEN: You know, for a bill that was originally started out to prohibit the hunting of pigs, wild pigs, I just have one thing to say--who, who, who, who let the hogs out, who? (Laughter)

SENATOR CUDABACK: Are you through, Senator Jensen? On with discussion, Senator Bromm. Senator Bromm, did you waive off? He waives off. Senator Erdman.

SENATOR ERDMAN: Thank you, Mr. President. I'm not sure how to follow that, but I'll try. Here's what I am going to do, members of the Legislature. Senator Wehrbein has offered his amendment. Senator Hudkins also has hers drafted as well. I have mentioned to the Clerk that when Senator Chambers either withdraws his motion or presumably it would fail, I don't know, that I will withdraw my amendment, but I would yield my time to Senator Schrock.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Erdman, you really can't withdraw your amendment right now. It's not really before us.

SENATOR ERDMAN: I understand that, Mr. President. I was alerting the body.
