district. And that's referring basically county attorneys, is what that's referring to.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: I don't want to imply...I'm just a little uncomfortable with it. I don't know what I'll do here. There is room for mischief in something like this. And I recognize the need. This is straightforward. It's not anything that I can...I don't understand the dilemma. But I have a little problem with the solution. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Wehrbein. Senator Cunningham on the committee amendment.

SENATOR CUNNINGHAM: Thank you, Senator Cudaback and members. I have a question for Senator Baker also.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Baker, would you respond?

SENATOR BAKER: Yes I would.

SENATOR CUNNINGHAM: Can you go into a little more detail of why we should elect someone that doesn't reside in that district?

SENATOR BAKER: Well, in the case of the county commissioners, they can run for it and be elected, but if they are elected, then they have to move into that district that they serve.

SENATOR CUNNINGHAM: Why should they be able to run for it if they don't live in that district?

SENATOR BAKER: Well, some people...in this case, in Red Willow County, the person did not want to move until elected. And as it turned out, he was disqualified, as the statutes read, from even running. So he was removed from the ballot.

SENATOR CUNNINGHAM: But why don't we do that for the Legislature then? So I'd pick and choose what district I want to run, and if I win, I'll move.

SENATOR BAKER: This only applies to county commissioners. I think in the Legislature, you have to be a resident of that
