SENATOR BEUTLER: Is that accurate?

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR HARTNETT: Yeah, that's the way it is right now. So I would be glad to visit with you, so.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay. Okay, thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Beutler. Senator Janssen, on the advancement of LB 97.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Thank you, Senator Cudaback. Members of the Legislature, Senator Beutler, if there is no one using that alley or there is no access created by that alley, then the city council will come along and suggest that this be terminated. But if there is access, some several people have access, they will not close it. It will have a hearing in front of the city council, so if there are four or five people that are using that alley then it won't be considered for closing. If no one is using it, no one protests it at their hearing, then they will go ahead and close that alley. Oh, but they do remain...they do retain the...if there is a sewer running down that or so on, so forth, they can have access to come in and unclog the sewer or whatever they would have to do if there's a broken main or a water main going down that alley. But as a rule, those are alleys that have been there for years and people have either built new homes and changed their access to those alleys to the street. Then they do consider closing that dirt alley. So it was pretty clear to us in committee that this was the right way to go, and if there are protests the governing body will certainly look at that. With that, I'll give the rest of the time back to the Chair.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Janssen. Senator Beutler.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Senator Janssen, you were talking about how this worked a little bit so let me ask you, because I wanted...my question really relates very much to some of the things you were talking about. But let's say we have a block. It has 16 residents on the block. There's an alley that goes
