SENATOR FOLEY: No.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Then why are you against prohibiting discrimination based on sexual orientation?

SENATOR FOLEY: Well, that was not part of the green copy of the bill. There was no testimony before us that would have indicated that there's a need for that amendment to the bill.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, so you won't take all my time, because you answered what I was asking. Members of the Legislature, that shows you how deep the hostility to gay men and lesbian women goes with some people, but that is not my primary problem with the bill, because I don't think it ought to go anywhere. I'd like to ask Senator Aguilar a question or two, and I hope we don't run out of time. Senator Aguilar,...

SENATOR AGUILAR: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...a person makes an application to go to the drug court. Is that true?

SENATOR AGUILAR: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And that is prior to the person having been tried, convicted and sentenced to anything by the criminal justice side. Is that true?

SENATOR AGUILAR: Yes, it is.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And the way this bill is drafted, and I hope Senator Brashear and some of the others are listening, this bill would want the authority to put somebody in jail who has never been convicted of a crime. Isn't that true?

SENATOR AGUILAR: Only as a last resort, Senator.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, whether it's the first or last, it would want the authority to send somebody to jail without having been convicted of any offense. Isn't that true?
