sentenced to jail on the original offense. If he or she fails the drug court, he or she can be sentenced on the original offense. What Senator Aguilar is asking us to do is forget the original offense that a person would be sentenced for, let that person stay in drug court, and be sentenced to jail for violating a provision of the drug court. This is called a drug court, but it's not a court. They do not have trials. They do not determine guilt or innocence. There is nobody sentenced in drug court. Drug...they call it a court, because in Douglas County, a former judge presided. It is not a court. It does not adjudicate guilt or innocence. It's like a second thumb out here on the side of the hand. So what Senator Aguilar wants to have is the option for the court to sentence a person to jail on the original offense, but also to sentence the person to short-term jail for violating a provision of the drug court agreement. That is a punishment for a noncriminal offense. And that's what it is. And I suggest that the members of the Legislature pay attention to what they know the law is. And I know people who want this bill will give all kind of emotional arguments on how they feel and what they want. But the facts can be gathered from the language of this green copy. And if people bring a bill and don't understand it,...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...he or she should just say, I don't know, instead of trying to misstate what the bill says. If you look on page 3 of the bill, starting in line 5, the court may impose short time...short-term jail time or detention as a sanction for noncompliance of the drug treatment program. Not committing a crime. Not the original offense. So some of you all may go for this. But I won't. And I'm going to fight it tooth and nail. That's why I say, it is a bad bill. It is punishment on top of punishment. Senator Aguilar, if a person is sentenced to this short-term jail for not complying with the program, then goes on to fail the program, he or she can be sent back and punished on the original offense. That's still hanging there as a hammer. Isn't that true?

SENATOR AGUILAR: Yes, that's...the discussion has been.
