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SENATOR HARTNETT: District.

SENATOR BEUTLER: And from our prior conversation, I understand yours is run by a juvenile court.

SENATOR HARTNETT: Yes, that's...as I under...I got a call in to the gentlemen, but I can't get a hold of him, and so forth. And I...Senator Thompson is off the floor. I don't see her. But I think she's more familiar with it. But I think the court seems to be working, you know, all right at the juvenile. So I guess from that standpoint, I would like to, you know, see the juvenile, maybe an amendment to this, or something. But...or sometime, if we're going to...if the bill is going to move, that we'd both allow both district courts and juvenile courts. And Senator Chambers, if you want some more time. If that's all right with Senator Beutler, we could do something down the road to have both courts?

SENATOR BEUTLER: Yeah. No, I'm interested in looking at this. But it raises an interesting question. You know, most of the time...in fact, I think there is some joint jurisdiction. But most of the time, we decide what court we want to do something out of. And now they seem to be forming here and there as a result of grant applications. And we have at least one in a juvenile court now. And are the other three in district courts? I don't know where they are.

SENATOR HARTNETT: Yeah, I don't know.

SENATOR BEUTLER: But that kind of raises another question. Is this just for juveniles, or is this for adults? Or how are we going to structure this thing? Or how are we going to hold it together so everybody is doing...kind of going along on the same path?

SENATOR HARTNETT: Yeah. Senator Chambers, would you li'e...?

SPEAKER BROMM: Senator Chambers, you have three minutes.
