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little more discussion about whether this should be a juvenile court, or a district court, or should we let the Supreme Court make rules that will allow both to do it. I...and maybe, Senator Aguilar, maybe you have some opinions on that, whether it should be one or both, or how that should be controlled too. And then that might better guide me as to how to further amend my amendment. I would give the rest of my time to Senator Aguilar.

SPEAKER BROMM: Senator Aguilar, you have a little over two minutes.

SENATOR AGUILAR: Actually, that's exactly why I turned my light on, Chris. I did want to touch on one thing. Because now that the conversation has turned to juvenile courts, not all jurisdictions have juvenile courts. And that is why we go through the district court in central Nebraska. We don't have a...I wish we did. We have tried for years to try to get one there. I think they're great things. But right now we don't have one. And most areas of the state don't have juvenile courts.

SPEAKER BROMM: Senator Beutler.

SENATOR AGUILAR: I'll give that time back to Senator Beutler.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Yeah. And that's another interesting aspect of it. Because juvenile court, where they exist, take the functions of the county court. And so if you didn't go to a juvenile court, you might logically think maybe these should be in county court. But suddenly they appear in district court. And I assume it's because some people were interested in doing it and they just got it done. But that's a further splitting of jurisdictions. I mean, if you're going to allow it in the juvenile court, in those counties that don't have juvenile courts you probably should allow it in county court. So maybe your word "court" in the beginning was the right word.

SPEAKER BROMM: One minute.

SENATOR BEUTLER: But that makes it even more troublesome in
