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SENATOR AGUILAR: ...that's part of the agreement that they go into of their free will.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: I understand that. But that's not the same thing.

SENATOR AGUILAR: And...

SPEAKER BROMM: One minute.

SENATOR AGUILAR: ...let me go a step further and elaborate a little bit and speak to the issue that judges put those other sanctions in there because they expect these people to fail the first time. Methamphetamine is such an addictive drug that they anticipate their failure. That's why they put the lesser sanctions in there first, is really make an effort to try to help these people, get them the help they need.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Do you have any idea how many people have gone through drug court in Nebraska?

SENATOR AGUILAR: Yes I do. I'm going to get a confirmation of that if you'll give me a second.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Okay.

SENATOR AGUILAR: There's 430 currently enrolled in drug court. As far as how many has graduated, I don't have that number. I can get it for you.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: And have we ever had an attorney raise the questions that are being raised here on this floor on behalf of their clients?

SENATOR AGUILAR: Not yet.

SPEAKER BROMM: Time. Thank you, Senator Aguilar and Senator Schimek. Senator Schimek, your light is next.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Thank you, Mr. President and members. I'm not sure that I have any more questions at this point, Senator
