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SENATOR CHAMBERS: The theme song could be "Straighten Up and Fly Right" and everything will be all right. But if you don't, then you go back to where you were, meaning that the charges will be filed and so forth. So you're given that chance to avoid not just going to jail, but even having a conviction on your record.

SENATOR STUTHMAN: So in other words, if you fail to comply, you go back to your start, to the basis of the charge originally, and then it is dealt with, without a second chance to go back to the drug court?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes.

SENATOR STUTHMAN: Thank you very much. That is all I have. Thanks.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Stuthman. Senator Wehrbein.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Thank you, Mr. President, members of the Legislature. I was interested in this too. I noticed Senator Foley has an amendment coming up that kind of gets away from the issue that Senator Chambers...or at least maybe solves it. But Senator Aguilar, I understand you do not like that amendment, taking away the hammer of the sentence? This would be Senator Aguilar.

SPEAKER BROMM: Senator Aguilar, you yield, please?

SENATOR AGUILAR: I think it detracts from everything we're trying to accomplish here. I think we need that hammer.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: If I may ask a question then,...I jumped ahead, Mr. Speaker. Sorry. But what are the other courts doing? There's four other courts in the state. Are they using the framework that Senator Chambers talked about?

SENATOR AGUILAR: I think there's only one court, and that's Senator...Sarpy...Douglas? Douglas County Court, that's using that system.
