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Senator Hartnett's amendment and seeing what you think?

SENATOR AGUILAR: Yes, I'd be agreeable to listen to that.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay. Well, then I'll just shut up. And those who want to discuss aspects of it a little bit more can do so. And we'll await his amendment, and I'll withdraw mine then, so we can get to it, if that's what you would like to do. Is that agreeable?

SENATOR AGUILAR: Yes, that would be agreeable.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Beutler?

SENATOR BEUTLER: That's true. That's all I have at the moment, Senator Cudaback.

SENATOR CUDABACK: You did not withdraw your amendment. Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, Aretha Franklin had said, "I guess I'll never be free / Since you got your hooks in me." And when you amend an amendment, you've got your hooks in that amendment, and it can't be withdrawn. But I'm not opposed to considering Senator Hartnett's amendment. So I think we will have to discuss a bit more what is before us, while his amendment is being drafted. And an amendment of the kind that he is offering is one which at this point in our proceedings I would accept. And then if that amendment is adopted, I would not stand in the way of the bill being advanced. We can save Senator Foley some heartburn. Because if it's not accepted, then I'm going to offer an amendment where we have the nondiscrimination clause, that we include, you cannot discriminate in this program based on sexual orientation. We will have to continue working with this bill for about maybe 20 or 25 more days, unless Senator Aguilar wants to roll the dice and call for cloture. Because all he'll get is a vote. But it doesn't say he'll get a vote to advance the bill. And if it fails to advance, not only must it be taken off
