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SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Aguilar, would you yield to a question?

SENATOR AGUILAR: Yes, Senator.

SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: I've heard that you were supportive of Senator Hartnett's amendment. Is that true?

SENATOR AGUILAR: That is true.

SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: I guess I just have problems with, you know, why this broad of language is needed. Each one of these drug courts, from what I understand, is successful, each in their own different way. They have peculiarities. They have their differences. They contract with local service providers. I'm at a loss of why this is needed. I mean, the old saying of, if it's not broke, don't fix it. From what I understand from the Douglas County drug court, they have a lot of success. And I spoke to it the other day on my amendment, for...to try to emulate what the Douglas County Court does for community corrections. I spoke to that. And I don't...I am...have reservations and concerns about the Supreme Court coming in and writing regs and promulgating rules that might be contrary to what's working in Douglas County. So why do we need this?

SENATOR AGUILAR: The Supreme Court has already been involved. They've been involved from the git-go. As a matter of fact, a lot of the language came from suggestions from the Supreme Court. Chief Justice Wright helped me a lot on some of the language that was in there. And I have every confidence in the world that the Supreme Court will do the right thing and establish rules and regs, which they were going to do anyway, which was going to happen originally. You know, once these are set up, the Supreme Court still is the overseer of all this, and they were going to determine rules and regs anyway.

SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: There are such wide variances in these court programs. Douglas County is a true diversion program. We have juvenile program...are they...is there going to be a separate track written for rules for the juvenile track as there are for adult offenders?
