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SPEAKER BROMM: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...you don't care about. This modest increase, and all of you who have spoken against this bill talk about the fact that these businesses are paying far more than the minimum wage or the amount that this bill would call for. Then why don't you just leave it alone and let those who will be helped by it be helped? But, no, that's not the way you do. Some of you will go home and you'll see your spouses this evening. Some of you will have little children and you'll pick them up and you'll want them to think you're a great daddy or a great momma, because they don't understand what daddy is doing down here and what momma is doing down here. And when you go to talk, you'll tell the chamber of commerce how, by God, we kept that minimum wage down. But if you should happen to go to a constituency of people other than the business suits, you won't tell them how you spoke against the minimum wage, how you felt the poor have plenty already and that if you give them something these businesses at the top are going to be offended. What kind of statistics would...

SPEAKER BROMM: Time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...Senator Mines expect to get from the chamber of commerce when they oppose these bills? He got just what he could expect. I could have told him what they'd tell him. They don't tell the truth. They have come before the Business and Labor Committee...

SPEAKER BROMM: Time.
